
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### **About Us: PHAC and Impact Assessment**


- PHAC mandate:
  - Promote health, prevent disease and injuries, and manage public health emergencies
  - Strengthen public health collaboration, facilitate public health policy and planning, and apply research and development to Canada's public health programs
- PHAC's focal point for Impact Assessment is located within a team that work on:
  - Health in All Policies
  - Whole-of-government Initiatives
  - Intersectoral Action



### **PHAC's Role in Impact Assessment**

PHAC provides expertise to support the assessment of health effects in IA, related to 3 key areas:

- Social determinants of health
- Health equity
- Mental Health
- New federal authority (2023/24)
- Equivalent of 1.5 full-time employees to support this work.



### **PHAC's Role in Impact Assessment**

- PHAC is resourced to support a very specific aspect of Impact Assessment
- Our work is scoped accordingly, to focus on:



**Project Reviews:** analysis and input on technical project documents to strengthen considerations for health and wellbeing



#### Additional activities (where capacity allows):

- Co-Chair an interdepartmental working group on Social Determinants of Health
- Support guidance development linked to PHAC's areas of expertise

# **Building our Evidence Base**

Evidence Reviews & Knowledge Products Underway

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- PHAC is undertaking two projects to inform its technical review of documents on priority topics within our mandate:
  - Scoping review on project effects to the mental health, well-being and wellness of Indigenous Peoples in Canada
    - Summary report and Glossary of Terms compiled from 48 articles
  - Rapid review on the effects on health and social determinants of health of industrial work camps on workers, their families and nearby communities
    - Summary report of 21 articles



- **Positionality:** this work was undertaken by non-Indigenous authors and federal public servants, with the aim to foreground the views, experiences, and priorities of Indigenous Peoples in Canada
- Our ways of working involved:
  - $\circ$  a broad definition of evidence
  - o collaboration with PHAC subject matter experts and IA health partner depts.
  - o holistic consideration of mental health
  - o disaggregating findings
  - $\circ$  synthesis of information
  - $\circ$  prioritized evidence by Indigenous authors and organizations
- Anticipating working versions to be completed within the next 6 months; currently seeking reviewers interested in providing feedback


# **National Collaborating Centres for Public** Health

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# Social Determinants of Health Considerations for Impact Assessment

Important to consider social determinants of health and assess whether the project activities are likely to introduce impacts to health resulting from changes in any of these areas, for example:



Employment opportunities, working conditions, income inequality, cost of living, access to education



Access to and availability of health and social services



Social cohesion, community safety, cultural continuity



Housing availability and affordability, early childhood development



Food security, traditional and cultural conditions, access to land



Fair distribution of benefits, discrimination
